## FRESHMEN FIRST

The counselors have scheduled parent meetings for those Freshmen students who are having difficulties in their academic subjects. If you feel that your child is not doing well and would like to arrange a Parent/Teacher conference, please call the Counseling office at 859-2231 to request a meeting.

Starting on $\mathbf{1 / 1 9 / 1 0}$ the counselors will begin meeting with their Freshmen individually to discuss course selection for the 2010-2011 school year. After they meet with their counselor, they will bring home a Course Selection Form with their TENTATIVE choices. Please discuss with them your expectations and what you consider to be appropriate choices. If you have any questions regarding the process, please contact your child's counselor. If you have questions regarding academic placement, please contact your child's subject teacher.

Counselors will be meeting with the Freshmen in small groups during the rest of the year to introduce them to the NAVIANCE program and to explore the relationship between their interests, school and possible career areas.

## SOPHOMORES

Starting on $\mathbf{1 / 1 9 / 1 0}$ the counselors will begin meeting with their Sophomores to discuss tentative course requests for the next school year. Please discuss with your child what courses you consider appropriate for him or her. If you have any questions regarding the process, please contact your child's counselor. If you have questions regarding academic placement, please contact your child's teacher.

Counselors will be meeting with the Sophomores in small groups beginning in March to review the PSAT score report. They will also introduce the students to the NAVIANCE program which will help students explore the relationship between their interests, school and possible career areas.

## JUNIORS

Meetings with the Juniors will take place during December in order to review the score report from the PSAT and discuss ways to use their personal score report as a guide to improve SAT performance. The counselors also administered a College Interest Inventory and discussed the College Search \& Selection process.

Staring on $\mathbf{1 / 1 1 / 1 0}$ the counselors will meet with their Juniors to discuss tentative course requests for the next school year. Please discuss with your child what courses you consider appropriate for him or her. If you have any questions regarding the process, please contact your child's counselor. If you have questions regarding academic placement, please contact your child's subject teacher.

On Thursday, February 11, 2010, there will be a workshop for parents on "The College Application Process". The program will take place at 7:00 p.m. in the Group Instruction Room (Rm. 130). On the same day, the Juniors will view a presentation during the school day on "Making Your College Search Count."

Seniors, if you have submitted a College Application on-line, do not forget to let your counselor know. Colleges do not usually notify us that you have applied on-line. You must let us know this information so that we can be sure to send your transcript and recommendations to the appropriate colleges.

## With that in mind here are the Top Ten Test Taking Tips!

1. Read each question VERY carefully. Underline what the question is asking you to do. For example: LIST Names, Find the height, WHEN did it happen.
2. THINK about what you are supposed to do. Do you have to add and then multiply? Do you have to provide facts to back up your statements?
3. If the question has multiple choices, look at ALL your choices carefully.
4. Eliminate answers you KNOW are wrong.
5. Take your best GUESS when you are not sure.
6. Try EVERY choice in a blank to see what makes the most sense or jogs your memory.
7. Make an effort to stay FOCUSED. Try not to keep looking around to see if others are done or look worried. Answer a few questions and take a mini break. Take a deep breath and stretch your neck and shoulders.
8. SKIP difficult questions and go back to them later after you have answered everything you do know.
9. Be sure you MARK the correct space for the answer when using an answer sheet. Use a blank sheet of paper to keep you lined up with the right question number.
10. Make sure to answer ALL questions you are supposed to answer. Do you have to answer 2 out of 3, 4 out of 5 or ALL questions in a section?

Remember; Get a GOOD night's sleep and have breakfast (your brain needs fuel) before your tests.
